

BOXTEO HISTORY GROUP

he Group's November talk was on the history of Trinity House by retired P&O

Captain Karl Lumbers.

Apparently in 1514 King Henry VIII presented a royal charter to a Guild of Mariners troubled by navigational problems on the River Thames and the action of unregulated pilots. This resulted in the establishment of the Trust of Trinity House to provide navigational aids such as beacons and marine buoys and the licensing of competent pilots on the Thames. It was also made responsible for the security of the king's shipyard at Deptford.

In 1566 Queen Elizabeth I passed the Seaman's Act which extended the provision of navigational aids to the approaches to all English ports. The 'Fraternity' comprising 38 Elders and 400 Younger Brethren still administer the Trust from its original headquarters at Tower Hill but its operational centre is at Harwich. Much has changed over time and now Trinity House, in addition to its navigational responsibilities, is the UK's largest maritime charity dispensing over £4 million each year.

t the December meeting fellow Group member Stephen Pollington

gave a talk on the Saxon burial site at Sutton Hoo. The site's secrets were hidden deep within a burial mound for over 1300 years until 1939 when a discovery was made which changed history. From the acidic sandy soil, archaeologists unearthed the imprint of a 27-metre long ship whose timbers had long since rotted away. This was revealed to be the burial mound of an Anglo-Saxon king, a rare find in this country, complete with his gold and silver treasures. Many other mounds had been looted during the reign of Elizabeth I to help finance the war with Spain, but two mounds at Sutton Hoo escaped this fate. Now managed by the National Trust, the site has recently been refurbished and it is hoped that the BHG will be able to visit on Wednesday 15th June this year.

Boxted Parish Council Report -

December 2021

oxted Parish Council doesn't schedule a Council meeting in December. We formally meet again in January. However, it is still a busy month with public meetings. The first was with Colchester Council where they came to show their plans for developing the 'garage site' behind Cross Cottages and then a meeting to go through the Essex Highways plans to demolish our beautiful and historic Boxted Bridge with a new larger structure.

The Village Green has been the focus of the volunteer biodiversity group which has and planted 1000s of bulbs and seeds to create two wildflower areas on the green. We have snakeshead fritilleries, white & blue camassia, wild primrose, cowslip and oxlip, yellow rattle seed and cuckoo flower. There are

also lots of daffodils in and around the hedges. We can't wait to see it looking so much better next year and we want to say a big thank you to the volunteers.

The other good news is the January opening of the Community Hub café. Our new tenant Doug Harper has oodles of café experience. Until the pandemic Covid19 he had a town centre venue 'Harper's Caffe' which was very well reviewed on Trip Advisor. He is taking up the lease knowing that the building will have to be closed in the summer for refurbishment, so we are very lucky to see the café open in the interim. If you like good Italian coffee fresh from the bean with a pastel de nata - which is a delicious Portuguese custard pastry—then do visit.

We know Doug will also put on a great breakfast and lunch menu. The café will be open 6 days a week from 8:45. Pop in and say hello and if you want to see more about **Harpers Caffe**

January 2022

oxted Parish Council met on the 12th January 2022 with Councillor Seakens as the temporary Chair of the Council following the resignation of Mrs Damen in November.

The major items discussed at the meeting were the planning application to replace **Boxted Bridge**, Wick Road which is being decided by Essex County Council (reference CC/COL/106/21) and the Parish Council will be objecting to the proposed demolition and replacement.

Secondly the **budget for 2022/23** was agreed and a Precept request to Colchester Borough Council (CBC) reflecting a 3.09% increase in Band D Council tax element.

We met the Rural Community Council of Essex (RCCE) advisor on Rural Exception Site (RES) Housing, and she confirmed that a landowner will work with a RES housing developer and CBC for a plan for 6 affordable rented units and one shared ownership property at a site (if approved) near Newman Drive. The Council have agreed to support an RES site as these schemes tie the housing land to people living, working or with a strong connection to the village in perpetuity. Applicants for the housing will need to be on the Local Housing List operated by Colchester Borough Council when the accommodation comes available.

ur Colchester Ward
Councillor said that the
Langham Treatment Works have
been running at very high capacity for
some time now and until there is
further capacity provided it is unlikely
that new housing will be permitted in
either Boxted or Langham. We are
waiting to see formal confirmation but
if forthcoming then we might have an
embargo on new homes until the end
of 2024.

The Council has not yet seen the revised development plans for the

Garage site near Cross Cottages but with a possible embargo on new builds this may be delayed for some time anyway.

The **Boxted Community Hub café** is open again with *Harpers Caffe* (previously in Colchester Town Centre) taking up residence.

Douglas Harper, with his daughter-Alice, is opening 6 days a week with good fresh food with a menu that will grow over time. He uses a good fresh Italian roast coffee and is open 8.30am – 4.30pm Tuesday – Friday and from 9am at the weekends.

We should see our harder surfaced access roadway on to the field installed this month. This will allow people to park on the grassed area without having to negotiate the mud

run on the way. Hopefully this will take a bit of pressure off the parking situation especially when the field is busy with sport. And in February we start the installation of most of our new play equipment.

We have recently heard that Mr Dedhar submitted a nomination to Colchester Council to fill one of our vacancies and has been elected. We have a further vacancy which will be advertised locally.

Langham Parish Council Report

Langham Parish Council Report Dec 21/Jan 22

In a new venture, the Council organised a Community Christmas tree on the Open Space opposite the

Shepherd & Dog. Local Church
Singers led a Community Carol
Singing Service there on the 23rd
December. There was a great turnout
of around 50 people. Everyone seemed

to enjoy it, so we hope this will now become an annual village event.

On the 4th Dec, the Council held a "Drop-In" Session at the Community Centre, to discuss our plans for a major upgrade to the Recreation Ground Play Area, together with longer term plans for a new multisports court. Turnout for this event was disappointing, so a second "Drop-In" was arranged for 22nd Jan with the hope of securing further engagement, particularly from Langham parents with younger children.

The planned December public meeting with Anglian Water and Sir Bernard Jenkin had to be deferred at very short notice due to COVID issues in the Anglian Water team. We await confirmation of a new date. However, in the meantime we have received early indications from our Ward Councillor Nigel Chapman that our concerns about lack of capacity at the Langham Water Recycling Centre may finally have

been listened to, with a potential moratorium being placed on further housebuilding until a WRC upgrade has been completed by Anglian Water in -2025. We await formal confirmation of this position.

At our 5th Jan Parish Council
Meeting, the budget and precept
request for 2022/23 were agreed. The
budget includes a large capital
expenditure element to deliver a major
upgrade and extension to the current
Play Area during the next year.

We also listened to a preliminary presentation from the Cricket
Development Manager for Essex and a representative from a local Essex/
Suffolk cricket club who have expressed interest in adopting
Langham as their home base and creating a new cricket pitch on
Langham's Recreation Ground.
Further discussions will be held to explore the potential benefits of this idea for our village. Views and comments from residents are most welcome – please email the Clerk or

Finally, we are sad to report that three of our Councillors are looking to step down over the next few weeks and months, which risks leaving us non-quorate if we fail to successfully recruit some new volunteers. This could be a tragedy for the village for various reasons. We risk losing our separate village identity and becoming a mere suburb of Colchester. In more concrete financial terms, it would almost certainly risk us losing any influence

on the local deployment of S106 funding associated with future housing development in Langham.





When Boxted and Langham were Very Wealthy


ive hundred years ago the Stour Valley was one of the wealthiest areas of the Country. The evidence to support that statement comes from the tax returns of the 1520s which exist in such detail that all the towns and villages of the country, excluding London, can be ranked in order of wealth. On that list eight of the wealthiest places in the country were along the Stour Valley and that wealth came from the cloth trade.

In the production of woollen cloth there are two distinct phases, first you have to produce the wool and then you have all the processes needed to convert the wool into cloth and marketing it.

The Cotswolds produced some of the best wool in Europe and so they made a lot of money selling or exporting it. We did produce wool here but it was a very poor quality and so it could be used to make working clothes but not the fashionable clothes which was where the big money could be made.

At the time of the Norman invasion most wool was being exported and

most cloth was imported, so the Normans encouraged the manufacture of cloth in this country. From this small beginning the trade, now called the Old Draperies, started mainly in the towns but rapidly spread to the villages as well because regulations in the villages were not so rigorously imposed. The trade slowly expanded and by 1300 was growing quickly, especially along the Stour Valley. Fulling was an important stage in the manufacture and a fulling mill is recorded in Langham in 1273, which makes it the earliest recorded fulling mill in England and shows that the trade had started to become industrialised by then. Also in about 1300 France was trying to annex Flanders and many Flemish cloth workers moved to England bringing their skills which gave the trade another boost. By the early1400s East Anglia, and especially the Stour Valley, were the most important producers of cloth. The trade continued to grow and it reached its peak in about 1500. The export trade then declined and had almost stopped by about 1650, although cloth would still have been



made for the local trade. The cloth that we had been producing was thick, warm and hard-wearing. Most of it was sent to London; from there it was exported to the Continent and then on towards the Baltic.

becoming very wealthy and there were clothmakers in Boxted, Langham and most of the villages along the Stour. The clothmaker would have employed specialised staff, such as weavers and many other trades. The preparation of the wool was mainly unskilled work but it was considered that it took 50 people to make enough yarn to keep one weaver busy and so the clothmaker was employing a lot of people and usually

had to go outside his village to get enough workers.

However the decline of the Old Draperies was not the end of the cloth trade because, during the reign of Elizabeth I, England had become a Protestant nation and the Catholic Philip II of Spain was persecuting the Protestants of the Low Countries. As a result, Elizabeth encouraged cloth workers from France, Belgium and Holland to come to England because they had skills at producing a thinner and brighter cloth, which was then the fashion. This started a second wave of the cloth trade, called the New Draperies. The New Draperies reached a peak in about 1650 and had almost died out by 1800.

ost of the New Draperies were based in the towns with people in the neighbouring villages doing the preparatory work. The New Draperies were more complicated to make and for them it was considered that it took 100 people to provide the yarn to keep one weaver busy. This would have kept many people in Boxted and Langham employed, albeit in a lowpaid, mainly cottage industry. During the whole period of the trade, Langham had worked with Dedham and after about 1700 Boxted, Dedham, Langham and Ardleigh were minor independent centres for weaving. After 1750 that trade declined and by 1800 had almost disappeared.

During the period of the cloth trade Norwich was a very powerful city. As it is also a long way from London it was able to avoid becoming involved with the London traders. The result was that Norwich and the neighbouring villages were wealthy throughout the period. The rivers in Norfolk are not suitable for fulling and so they made a different cloth, worsted, as it did not need fulling.

Remaining Evidence of the Cloth Trade:

long the Stour Valley there are a number of Cloth Churches built with the wealth created by the cloth trade. Until about 1540 the English were a Catholic nation and in those days the bigger, or the grander, the church you built the more you were glorifying God. The clothmakers were the major donors, perhaps helped by the thought that by showing his wealth and generosity he might spend less time in purgatory. The churches were restored or extended at the peak of the trade, between about 1480 and 1520. One of the best Cloth Churches is at Long Melford Church (pictured).

In both Boxted and Langham there are thatched cottages and almost all of them would have been built during the time of the Cloth Trade. In addition there a number of houses which are of timber-frame construction but have since been restored and lost the thatch. These too are likely to have been built during the Cloth Trade.

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




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
